Group Email for Club

These paragraphs explain how you can communicate among members of the club.

The "TO" line in the email that sent this newsletter has the current list of members and can be copied and used by members to pass information, only on club business, of course, to the membership. However, the list changes at times, with the addition of new members and there may be changes to current members' email addresses.

We have set up a group email address (wyamembers@wya-va.com) that you all can use. To ensure our privacy and eliminate spam, any email you send to wyamembers@wya-va.com goes through our web server and my email account where the current roster is updated and then forwarded to you all. You'll know when your email reaches everyone because you will be on the list and receive a copy of your own email at the same time it is passed to others. This process is more secure but at times may take a day for the email to reach the members. We'll try it and see how it works.

The other way you can communicate with members is to get phone numbers or email addresses from the membership roster on the MEMBERS Page of the web site. This roster list requires that password again. Once you get the password by clicking on the password link at the top of the MEMBERSHIP page you are ok. We'll change it at regular intervals.

NOTE: Some programs, such as MICROSOFT WORD have an auto correct spelling feature. It is located in Tools > Autocorrect Options. The default list changes "wya" to "way." Be careful with this auto correct feature or go to Tools > Autocorrect Options and delete the item labeled "wya."

Boat Facts

Safe Boat Operations – Knot Tying – Terminology

Knots are used for pulling, holding, lifting, and lowering. When using line for these purposes, it is often necessary to join two or more lines together. Knots and bends are used for temporary joining, and splices provide a permanent joining. In either case, the breaking strength (BS) of the joined line is normally less than the BS of the separated lines. The weakest point in a line is the knot or splice. They can reduce the breaking strength of a line as much as 50 to 60 percent.

Knots are the intertwining of the parts of one or more lines to secure the lines to themselves, each other (bends), or other objects (hitches). Because knots decrease the strength of the line, they should always be treated as temporary. If something permanent is needed, a splice or seizing can be used.

- The **running end** (bitter end) is the end of the line that is worked with.
- The **standing part** is the long unused or belayed end of a line. It is the remaining part of the line, including the end that is not worked.
- The **overhand loop** is a loop made in a line by crossing the bitter end over the standing part.
- The **underhand loop** is a loop made in the line by crossing the bitter end under the standing part.
- A **bight** is a half loop formed by turning the line back on itself.
- A **turn** is a single wind or bight of a rope, laid around a belaying pin, post, bollard, or the like.
- A **round turn** is a complete turn or encircling of a line about an object, as opposed to a single turn.
