# **Boating Facts**

And. here is a real life story from our own Shannon Ritter. Shannon reports:

We had a mishap with our boat, S.S.Ritter, and Phil thought that there may be a little lesson for all of us. So, here I go trying to tell this story. Several weeks ago we took our boat to Coles Point to hide from the storm Sandy. I always like to get a short haul and check things out, so this sounded like a good time to have this

done. Art Buswell assisted me with the trip and it was like so many trips before, not very eventful....just the way we all like it. Sandy, as we all know, was way out in the Atlantic when she passed us and for us she became the storm that wasn't.

Several weeks later; Sue, Bill Bowman and I went down to bring her back to Colonial Beach. Sue's job was to drop Bill & me off and then meet us at our home slip. So off we go out of Coles Point and all systems are at 100%. We had a cool but sunny ride to look forward to and a very light chop. Had a great time. I like to travel at 2500 RPM's, with normal conditions that gets me 9 to 11 knots so we are on the water between two and a half and three hours on this trip. Other than dodging a couple of fish traps and a lot of crab pots, we had no excitement on our return.

As I am backing into our slip (and if anyone has ever seen my slip it is not the easiest dockage), Sue calls out "Our swim platform is under water" and I knew instantly we had taken on water. What was going on? I didn't even suspect a problem. What the \$\*&@&!? I ran down to the rear stateroom to find that the carpet was in standing water, the master shower pan was full...just a total mess. Now that the boat had leveled, the forward bilge pump was running on automatic and is te only one of three on board that has a float. I switched the other two pumps on and we popped back out of the water soon after.

OK, bullet dodged, but what happened? Where is the water coming from? I noticed that one of the stuffing boxes was leaking pretty badly but could that cause that amount of water we had just pumped out? We tightened the bad stuffing box to shut it down completely. Bill, Sue and I got into cleaning mode. After all of that we decided that a few beverages would lighten our mood while all the time checking on the stuffing box. The next day I discovered the true problem. A \$2.00 hose clamp had rusted in half on the oil cooler. The fitting on the oil cooler is so short that you can't get 2 clamps on it. As long as the starboard engine was running there was a stream of water like someone had a garden hose running. I have no idea how long this was going on. Yep, a \$2.00 part will cost me hundreds and maybe more. This clamp is in a place you can't even see. You guys know the old touch and feel technique. So, after replacing that clamp I have been on a search for other clamps that are questionable. So far I have found three that I have replaced and I just pray that I get all of them. Our boat was repowered 10 years ago and has about 1200 hours on it now. So that is the time it took for that one clamp to fail. Is this a good indicator? I don't know, but it is a starting point. The other thing is, don't use the cheap clamps. Yes, they all say stainless steel, but some of them only have a stainless steel strap and a lesser material in the screw section. That is where mine failed, in the screw section. So spend the extra quarter or so and get the good stuff. You all know the drill, check, check, check!!!!
